PUBLIC NOTICE

MANDATORY COMPLIANCE:

High-Security Registration Plates (HSRP) and Statutory Vehicle Documents

It has been observed that numerous vehicles are plying without proper number plate affixed in the vehicle both at the front and the back. Some vehicles though they have registration number but are not fitted with **High Security Registration Plates (HSRP)**. They are in direct violation of the Hon'ble Supreme Court's directives and also Rule 50 of the Central Motor Vehicles Rules, 1989, which strictly mandate the affixation of High Security Registration Plates (HSRP) on both the front and rear of all motor vehicles.

It is also observed that some, heavy goods vehicles operating in border areas and on the outskirts of the State are frequently found plying without proper HSRPs, no number plate both in the front and back and lacking valid statutory vehicle documents.


In this regard, all vehicle owners and operators are instructed to ensure that the following requirements are complied with at all times:

- Should have **HSRP duly affixed** on both the front and rear of the vehicle in accordance with Rule 50 of the Central Motor Vehicles Rules, 1989.
- Should have a valid **Certificate of Fitness** as required under Section 56 of the Motor Vehicles Act, 1988.
- Should have a valid **PUC Certificate** as required under Section 190(2) of the Motor Vehicles Act, 1988 read with Rule 115 of the Central Motor Vehicles Rules, 1989.
- Should possess valid vehicle documents, including **Registration Certificate (RC)**, valid **Insurance Certificate**, **valid road tax**, **valid Driving Licence of the driver**, and any other documents as mandated under the Motor Vehicles Act, 1988 and rules framed thereunder.

All vehicle owners and operators are to ensure strict adherence to the aforementioned provisions of law.

Strict enforcement drive shall be carried out across the State, particularly in border areas and vulnerable routes. Any violation shall invite stringent legal action under the relevant provisions of the Motor Vehicles Act, 1988, including seizure and detention of the vehicle, imposition of heavy penalties, and, where applicable, imprisonment.

This is issued in the public interest.
